At the beginning of the year, some doubted whether the *Silver Queen* would exist. In need of help, staff sponsor Barbara Smith gave a rousing speech on the first day of school in an attempt to rally recruits. As it happens, this strategy worked. Thirty interested students showed up at the first organizational meeting, and the 1986-1987 yearbook staff was born; however, there was one major obstacle the staff had to overcome-lack of experience. Only one person was on last year's staff, photographer Garret Brandt. This meant that most of the staff members had to learn things like layout, ad design, and copywriting from scratch.

Also new to many was the intense pressure to meet deadlines. They always seemed to creep up until suddenly, six pages had to be finished and ready to be sent off by the end of the week. A late page meant extra cost and therefore was simply not allowed.

Many hours on a Saturday morning might be spent in the darkroom developing film. Often this was frustrating when half of the end product was discarded. Meanwhile, in the art room, a copy writer might be slaving away, trying to create a 500 word article with very little information. Other staff members might be undertaking the tedious process of arranging class pictures, or sports and activities sections. Still others spent hours finding sponsors for ads.

Each member of the staff was needed to make the *Silver Queen* what it is. This year's yearbook staff was one of the most sizeable and dynamic ever.

With a bit of creativity, a lot of patience, and a sense of humor, this book somehow all came together.

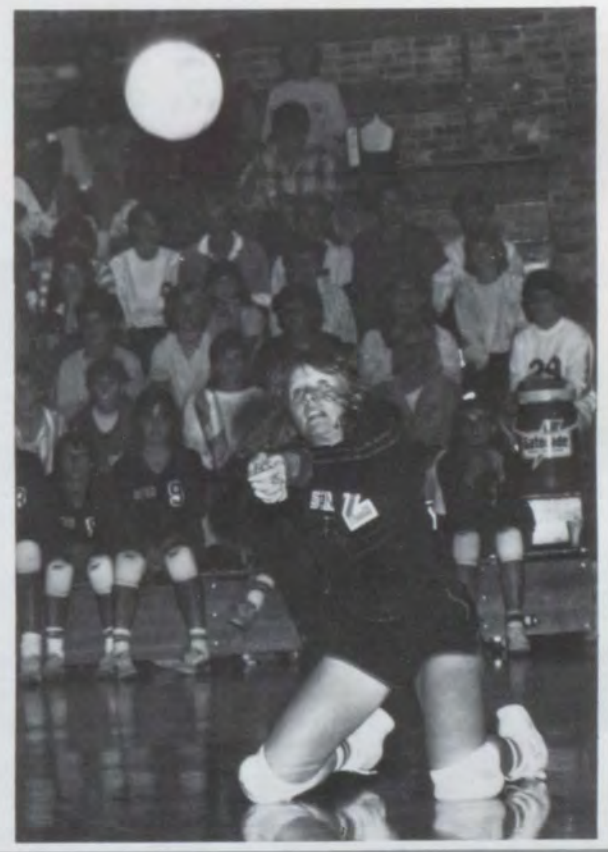


... SKIERS NEVER STOP

This year's Aspen Volleyball team had the height, depth, speed, and experience for a successful season. Coach Maddalone stated, "This team had the most talent out of any of the past volleyball teams that I have coached." The 1986 squad featured nine returning seniors, all well balanced players. The team was lead by four year starter Janene Caldwell. Her leadership was often the determining factor in the Skiers' early success. Skier starters were recognized for their hard work and achievement. Melanie Mount and Dana Gloor were named as All League players, while Jamie Olsen was voted Honorable Mention. Janene Caldwell made both All State teams, a first in Skier history. Winning the Northwestern League, the Skiers rolled to a record of 8-1 during the regular season, including a streak of six consecutive victories. For the Skier squad this year, there were many bright spots. The team enjoyed a large turnout, led by eight returning seniors. Senior Captains Bobby Kearsy and Justin Alderfer demonstrated their leadership on the field. Kearsy was named Offensive Honorable Mention at left guard, while Alderfer scored a team-high 33 points.

Other Skiers had respectable performances also. The offense was keyed by the passing talents of sophomore quarterback, Terry Smith, who accrued over 400 yards through the air and a sizeable line. Junior fullback Greg Mears led the team in rushing with more than 300 yards. Nate Hanson rallied the crowd with his acrobatic catches at wide receiver.

In recognition of defense achievement, junior linebacker, Joe Carlson was All-League Honorable Mention. Linemen Schlumberger and Satrapa were tops in tackles and fumble recoveries: Hanson led the team in interceptions, picking off three passes during the season.

For the Skier squad, scores were no indication of the sincere effort put forth by the team.
