snowboarding for five years with Aspen Skiing Company. This year she will be a paraprofessional in special education.



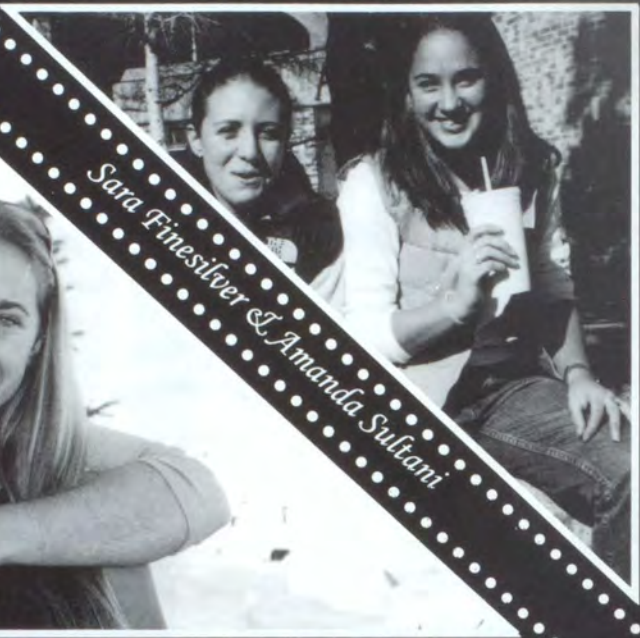

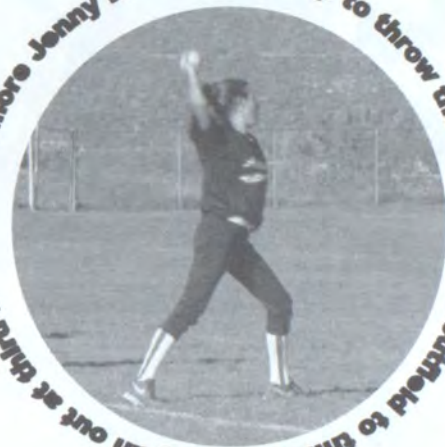

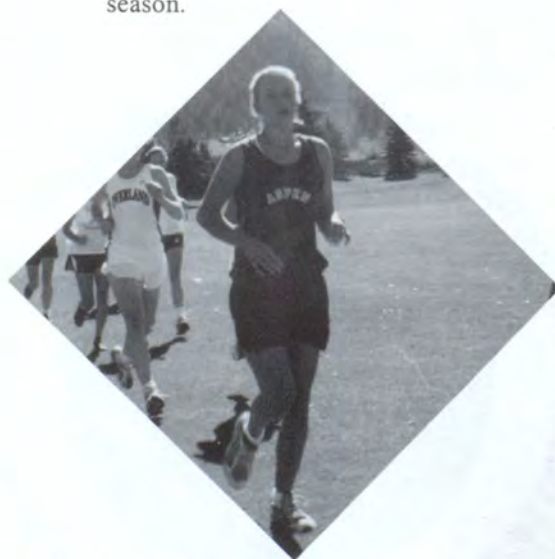

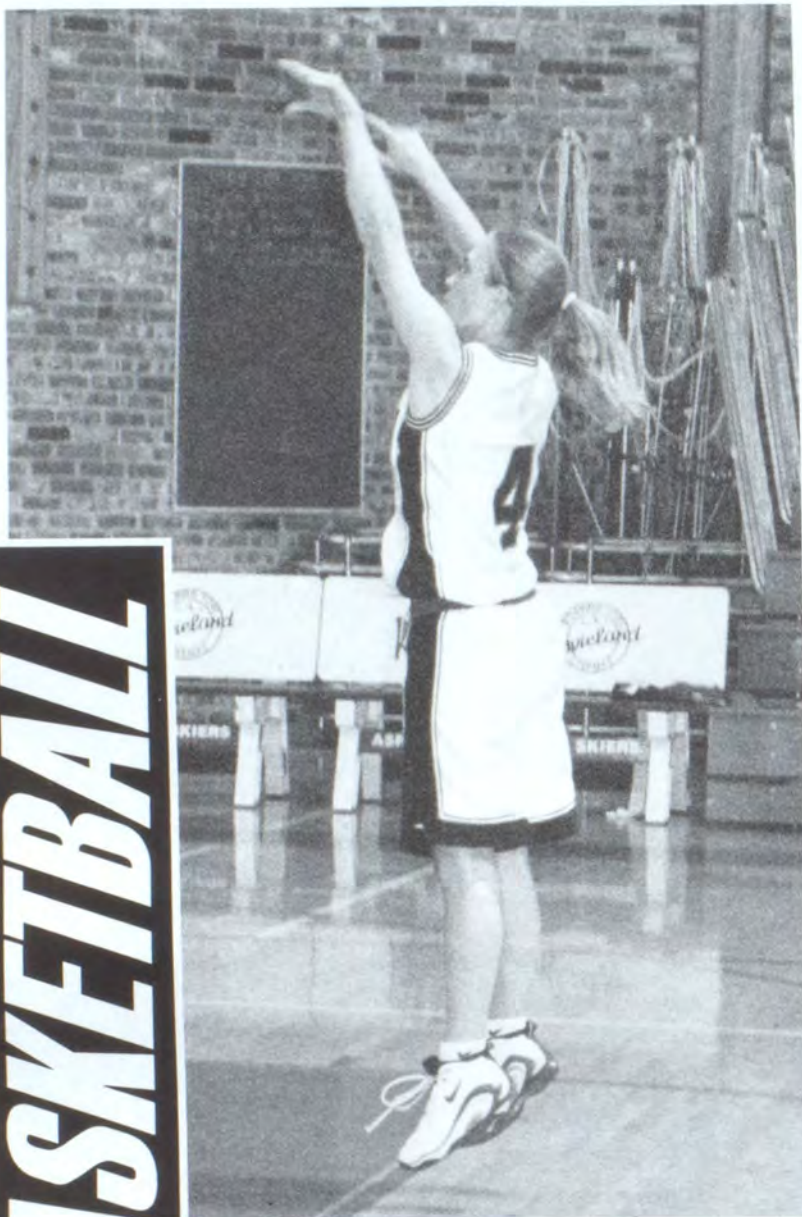

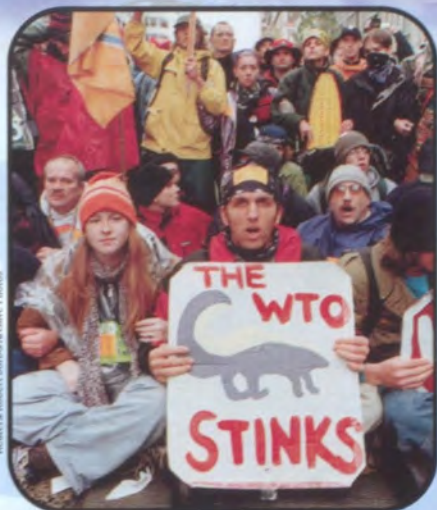

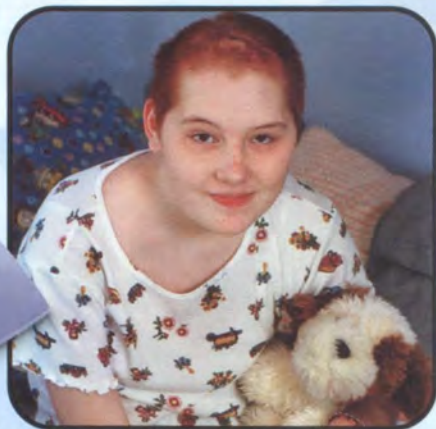

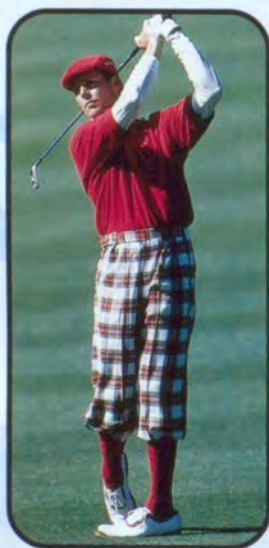

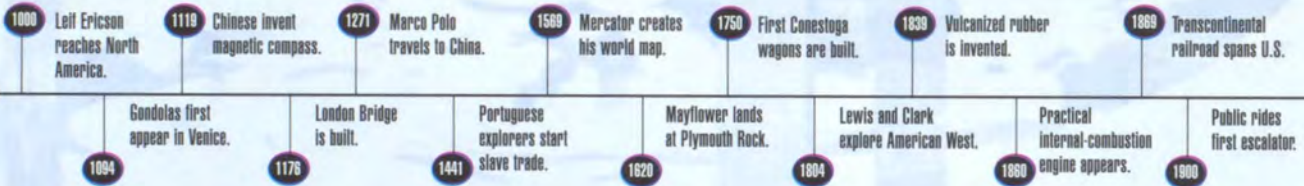
