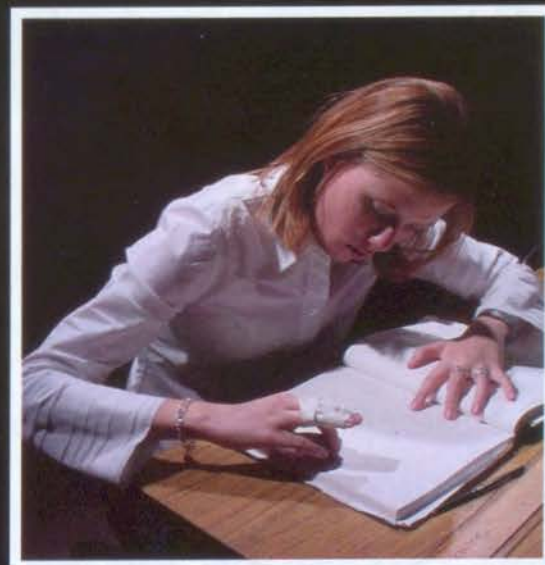

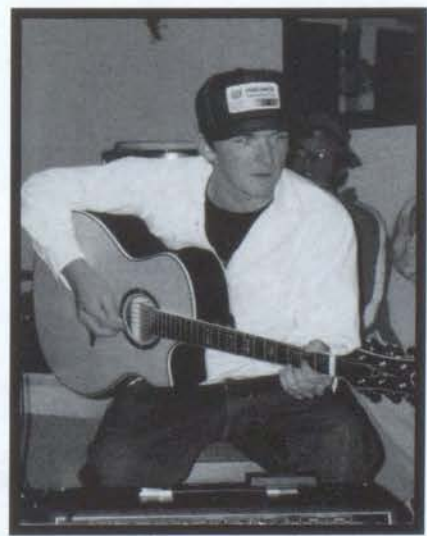


★ On The Night Before Homecoming...★

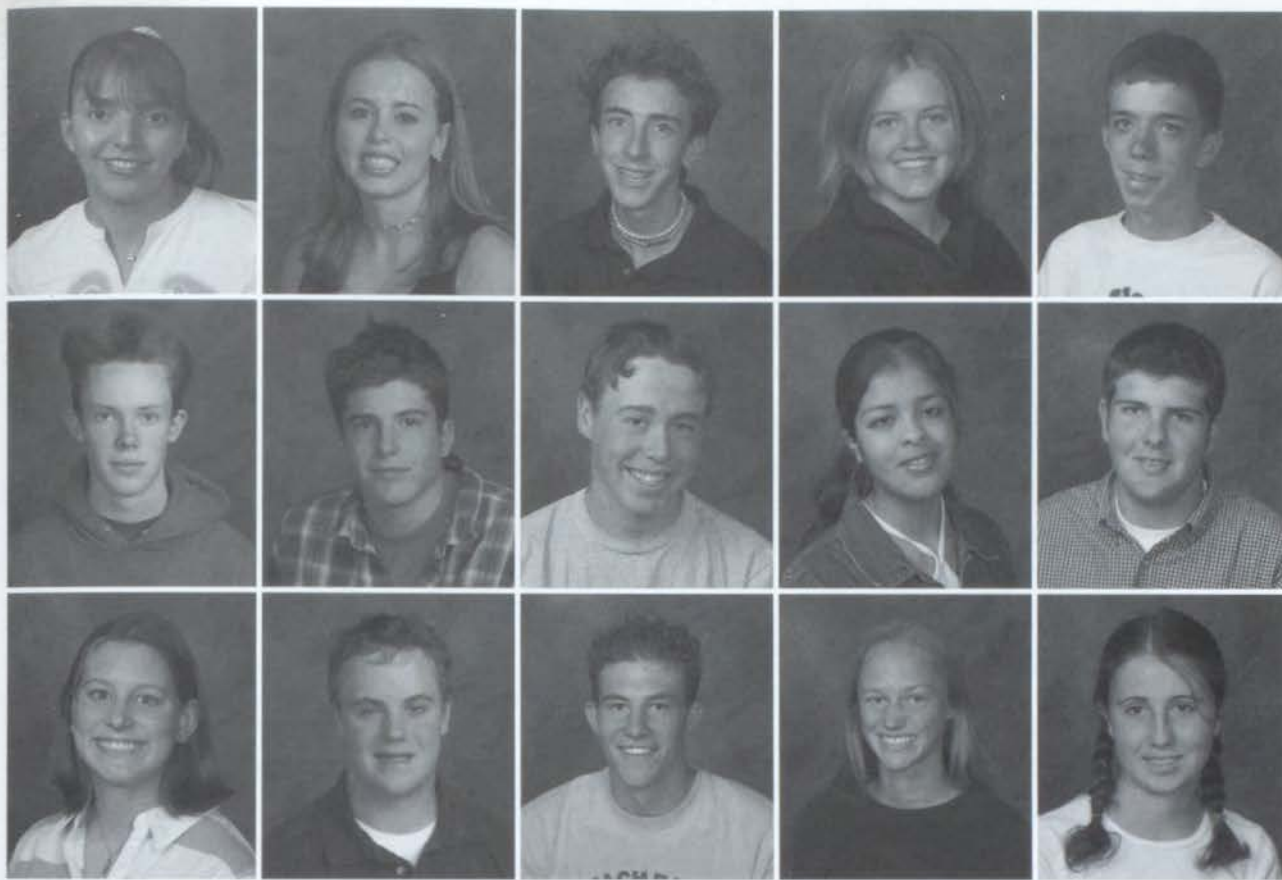


In the red. "If the students of the junior class don't start participating in fundraising, then we're going to have prom in the gym," teases junior class sponsor Alex Hodge.

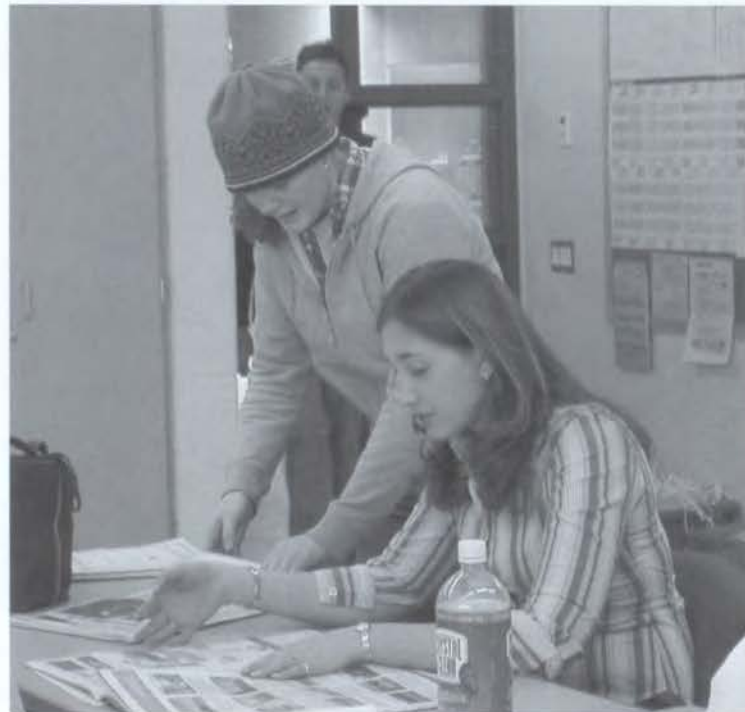

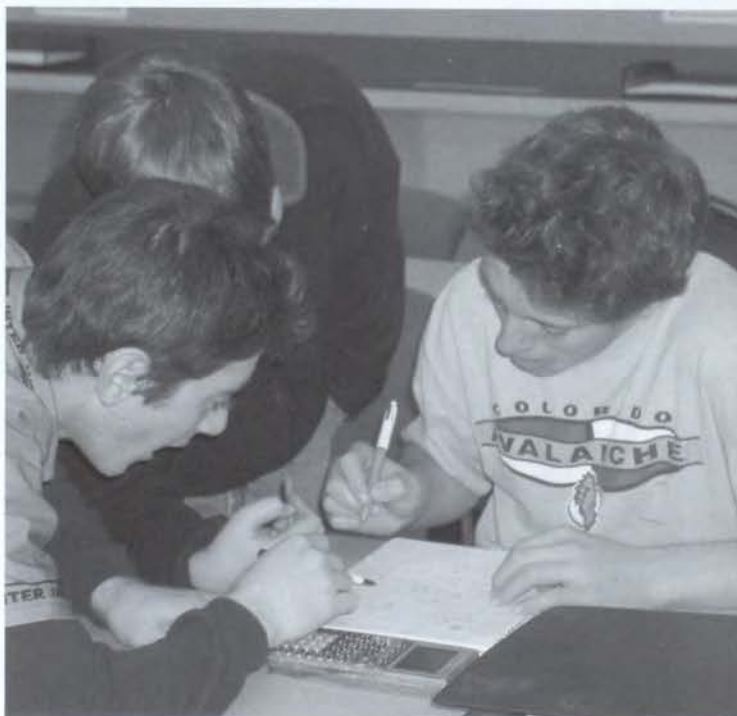

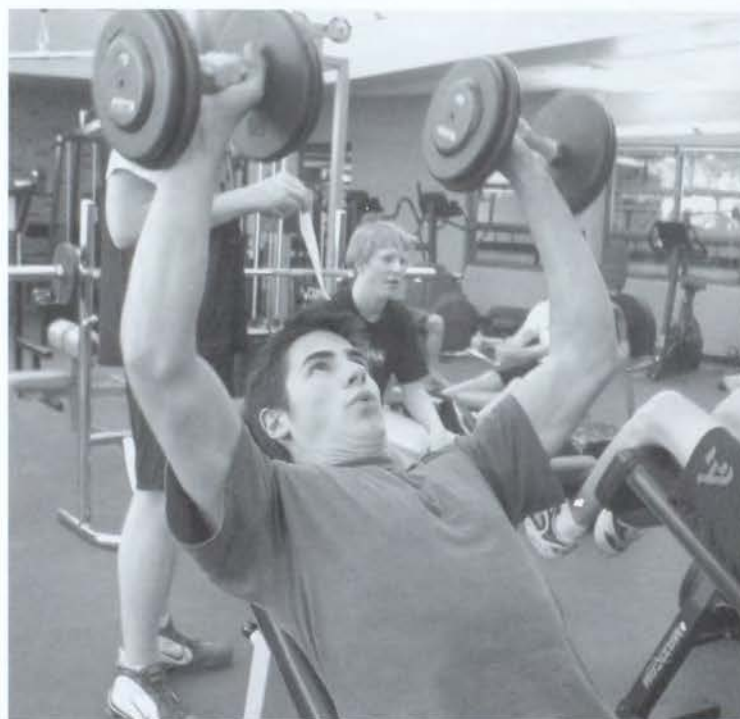

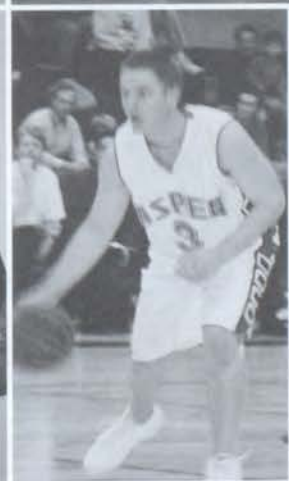

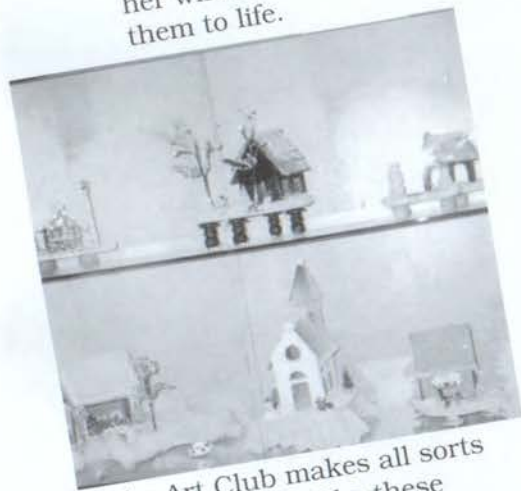

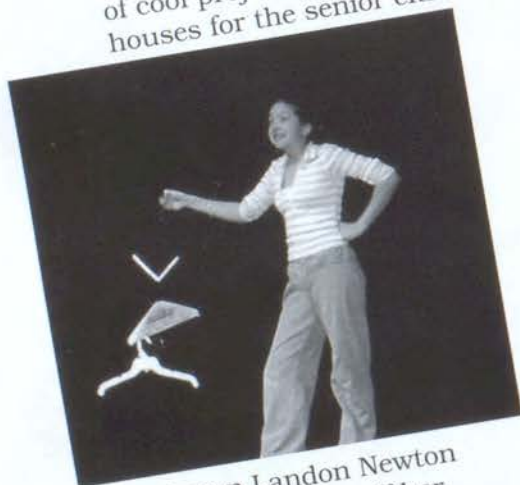

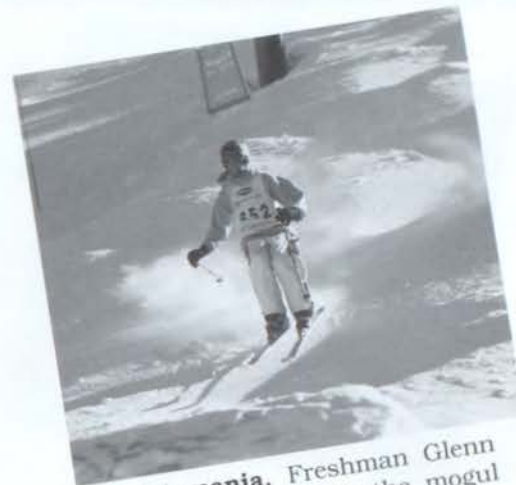

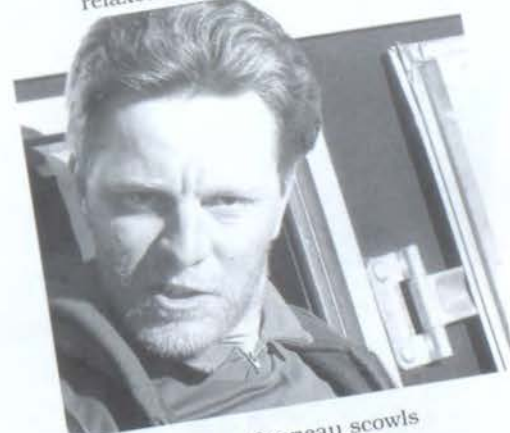

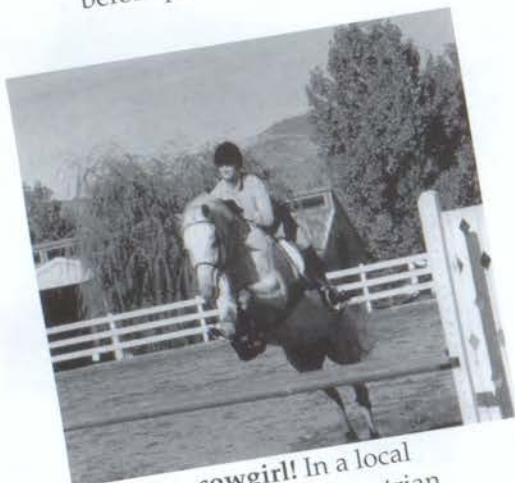

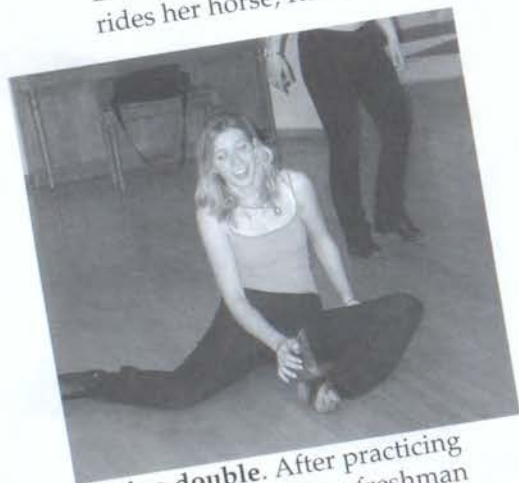

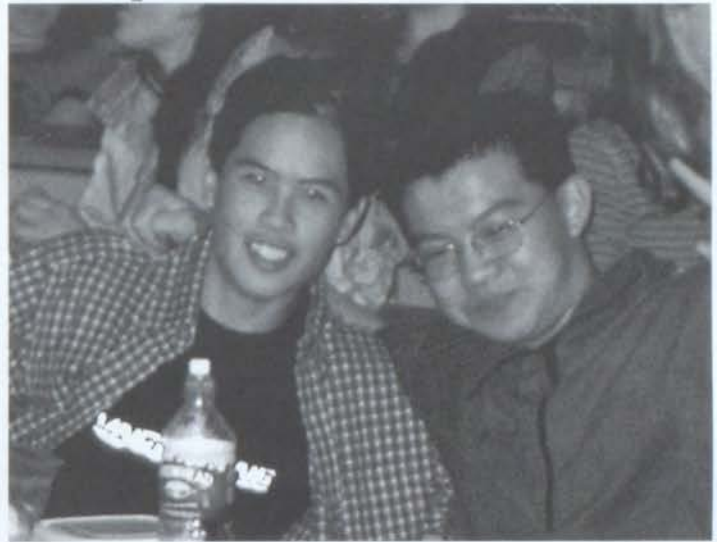

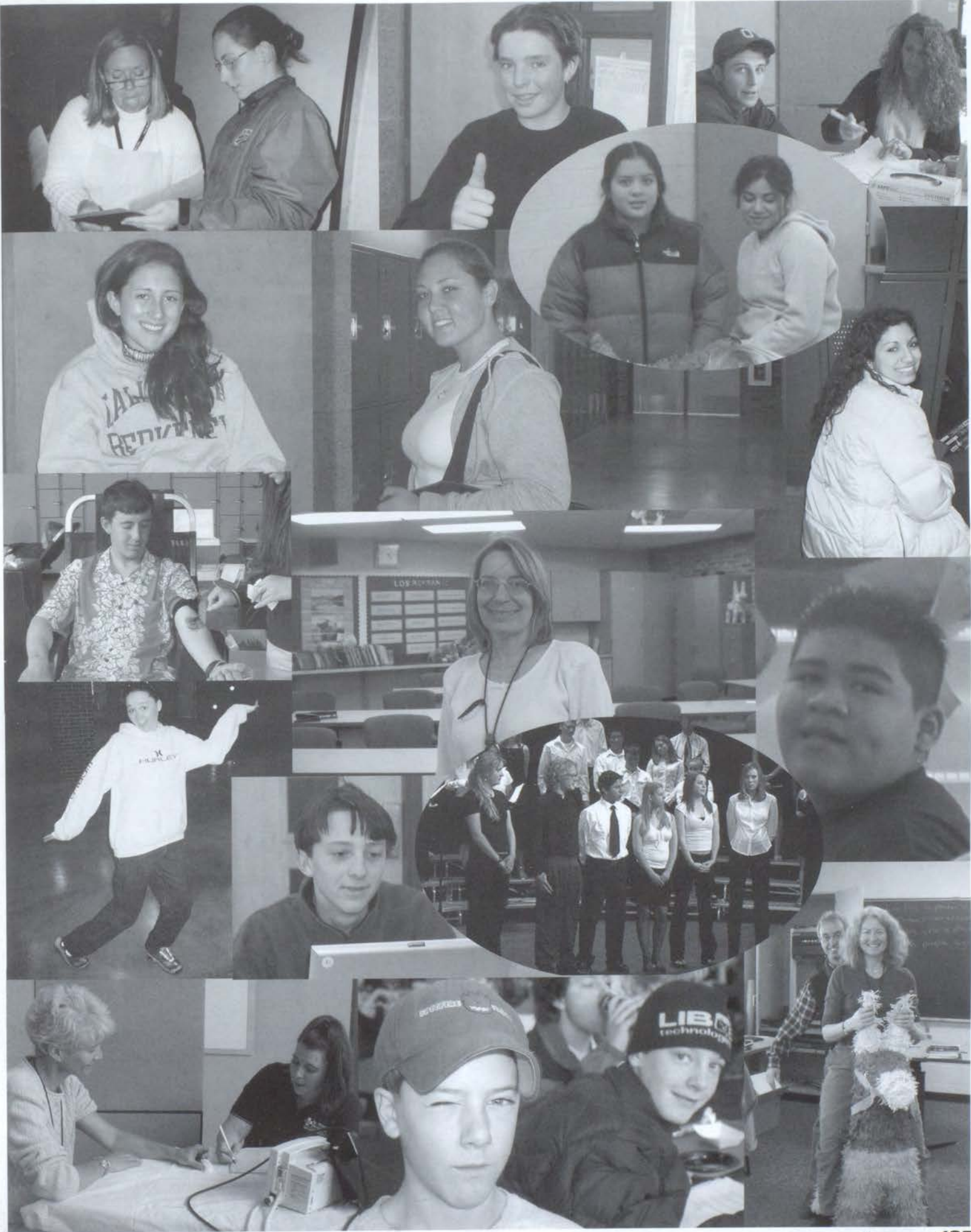
Birdie-Time

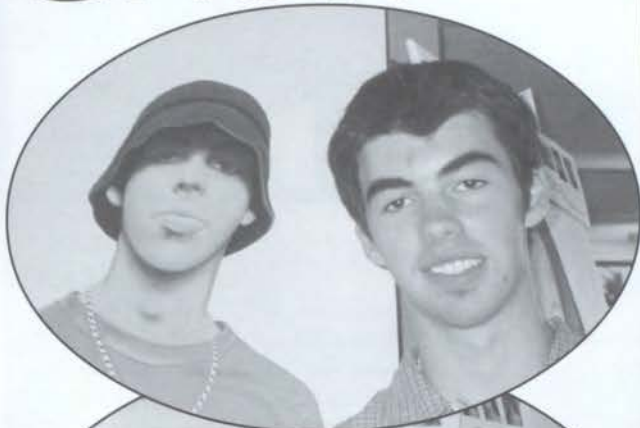

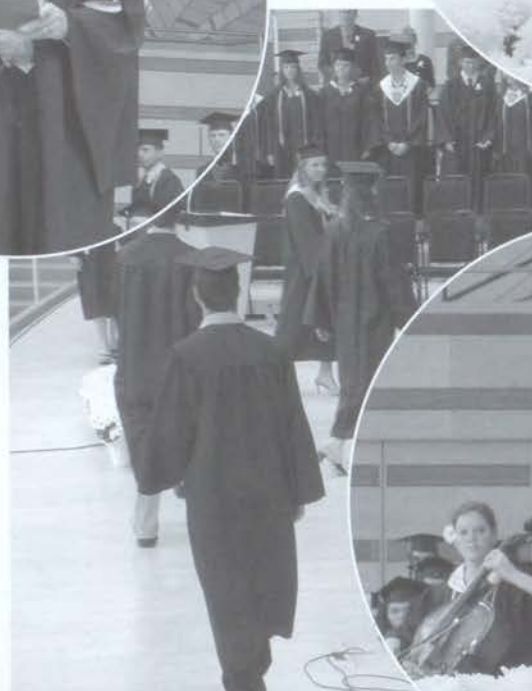
Graduation

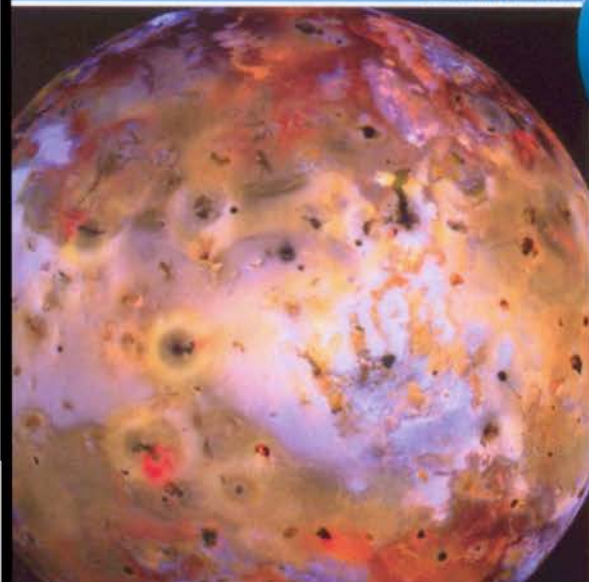
